#### Report on the simplified annual accounts

We have audited the accompanying simplified annual accounts of INSTITUTE FOR INTEGRATED TRANSITIONS (hereafter, 'the Association') which comprise the simplified balance sheet at 31 December 2015, the simplified statement of results, the simplified statement of changes in net equity and the simplified notes to the accounts for the year ended on that date.

Responsibility of the Board concerning the simplified annual accounts

The Board is responsible for drawing up the attached simplified annual accounts, so that they show a true and fair view of the net equity, the financial situation and the results of the INSTITUTE FOR INTEGRATED TRANSITIONS, in accordance with the framework of financial reporting standards applicable to the Association in Spain, which is explained in note 2a to the simplified annual accounts, and for such internal controls that they consider necessary to enable the preparation of simplified annual accounts that are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error.

# Responsibility of the auditor

We conducted our audit in accordance with the legislation regulating the auditing of financial statements in Spain. This legislation requires that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and execute our audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the simplified annual accounts are free from material misstatement.

An audit requires the performance of procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the simplified annual accounts. The procedures selected depend upon the judgement of the auditor, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement in the simplified annual accounts, due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor takes into account the internal controls relevant to the preparation of simplified annual accounts by the Association, in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not with the aim of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the internal controls of the entity. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of the accounting policies used and the reasonableness of the accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the presentation of the simplified annual accounts as a whole.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained provides a sufficient and appropriate basis for our audit opinion.

#### 01 ACTIVITY OF THE ASSOCIATION

The INSTITUTE FOR INTEGRATED TRANSITIONS (hereafter the Association) was established on 14 June 2012 to provide advice and training in contexts of political and post-conflict transition, as a means to contribute to more favourable conditions for the achievement of democracy, economic development, rule of law and public security in order to avoid the recurrence of authoritarianism or civil war.

To achieve this objective, the Association carries out, among others, the following activities: technical assistance, applied research, strategic events, training workshops, and advisory missions.

These involve neither profit motive nor any political or religious affiliation.

In 2015, the following activities took place:

#### **Advisory Work**

Throughout 2015, IFIT remained deeply involved in post-conflict transition planning efforts in **Colombia** in the context of its peace negotiations with the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia (FARC). IFIT participated as an independent expert adviser to the Colombian government delegation in all rounds of the negotiations until an "Agreement on the Victims of the Conflict" was reached between the parties in December 2015.

In 2015, IFIT also became the main adviser on the issue of amnesty and related legal-political issues within the Minsk peace process which seeks to end the armed conflict in the east of **Ukraine** between government forces and two armed groups – one in Donetsk region and one in Luhansk region.

IFIT also continued to receive – and whenever possible, acted upon – a steady flow of requests for expert advice and technical assistance from other transition and conflict-affected countries. These included requests, inter alia, from **Sri Lanka**, **Venezuela**, and **Thailand**.

#### Research and Publications

Inclusive Transitions Framework: In July 2015, IFIT published the *Inclusive Transitions* Framework. Based on two years of research, interviews, and expert workshops, this major publication outlines a new conceptual and operational framework aimed at improving outcomes in fragile and conflict-affected states transitioning out of conflict or repression by zeroing in on inclusiveness as a guiding principle. More than any other output, this publication comprehensively expresses IFIT's theoretical and practical vision of the challenges and opportunities of transition. It is geared in particular to fragile and conflict-affected states marked by violent and divisive practices; the absence of a widely accepted social covenant or social contract; and a deeply fragmented political identity.

Navigation Guide project: During 2015, IFIT made significant progress on this project, which aims to produce a unique handbook to enable national policymakers and civil society leaders to



improve their understanding of and interactions with the complex system of international financial and technical assistance that arrives *en masse* in the early period of a transition out of armed conflict or repression. The guide will help empower national actors in contexts of current transitions (e.g., Ukraine, Myanmar) and possible future ones (e.g., Colombia, Zimbabwe) to forge better relationships with internationals and better results for their countries.

During the year, IFIT also published a number of op-eds, including:

- Beating ISIL: Without identity, Iraqis have no will (Al Jazeera, July 2015)
- <u>Fragility the Main Hurdle to Implementing SDGs</u> (IPI Global Observatory, September 2015)
- Arabic-language op-ed on national identity in Iraq (Al Hayat, October 2015)
- What Guatemala can teach fragile states about cleaning up the justice system (October 2015)
- Kurds Need More Than Arms (New York Times, October 2015)

# **Courses and Workshops**

In partnership with the John D. Gerhart Center for Philanthropy and Civic Engagement at the American University in Cairo, and with the support of the Ford Foundation, IFIT organised a one-day roundtable in Barcelona in January 2015 on the topic of Effective Philanthropy for Syria: Envisioning an organized philanthropic response to a complete or partial transition out of armed conflict. The discussion addressed the role that global philanthropy can play under different potential scenarios for civil society in Syria.

With the support of the European Endowment for Democracy, IFIT also organised a one-day workshop bringing together international and regional experts in April 2015 in Barcelona to discuss the final draft of the *Inclusive Transitions Framework* just prior to its global publication.

With support from the Robert Bosch Stiftung and the law firm Cuatrecasas, Gonçalves, Pereira, IFIT also organised a two-day expert meeting in Barcelona in November 2015 to discuss its plans to create a *Law and Peace Practice Group*: an organised service of top experts that will be able to provide impartial, creative, realistic, and principled advice to parties involved in complex negotiation and mediation processes in which justice and legal security questions arise. Participants in the meeting included leading experts and representatives from countries in the midst of peace talks, international and regional multilateral organisations, foreign governments engaged in peace mediation, and international NGOs.

#### Other Activities

IFIT continues to conduct extensive institutional and stakeholder outreach as part of its global activities. In 2015, this included meetings with the leadership and senior staff of scores of governments, multilaterals, NGOs, think tanks, universities, and other public and private actors.

Regarding internal matters, the Institute continued to benefit from a supportive Board of Directors and International Advisory Group, both of which expanded in 2015. Leslie Vinjamuri joined the Board, and Hakan Altinay, Sujit Choudhry, Melanie Greenberg, Bassma Kodmani,



Ahmed Rashid and Jennifer Widner joined the Advisory Group. In the summer of 2015, IFIT also successfully underwent its third financial audit.

The Association is subject to Law 1/2002 of 22 March regulating the right of association and Book III of the Catalonian Civil Code concerning legal entities, approved by Law 4/2008 of 24 April. The Association is included in the Catalonian Register of Associations with the number 48.755.

The Association's fiscal and main operating address is 40 Benet Mateu Street, Barcelona. The following donors provided financial support toward the work of IFIT in 2015: the Irish Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, the Swiss Federal Department of Foreign Affairs, the Compton Foundation, the Karl Popper Foundation, the European Endowment for Democracy, the United Nations Development Programme, the Robert Bosch Foundation, the Ford Foundation (via the American University in Cairo), WING International Cooperation Limited, and Mr Jon Greenwald.

### 02 BASIS OF PRESENTATION OF THE ANNUAL ACCOUNTS

#### A. TRUE AND FAIR VIEW

The annexed simplified annual accounts have been prepared from the accounting records of the Association, and are presented in accordance with the applicable regulatory financial reporting framework in order to present fairly the assets, financial position, and results of the Association produced during the corresponding period. These statements are subject to the approval of the Board of Directors and are expected to be approved without any modification.

As at 31 December 2015, the financial reporting regulatory framework applicable to the Association is:

- The Catalonian Associations and Foundations Act (2008)
- The Accounting Plan for Foundations and Associations that are subject to the legislation of the Government of Catalonia (2008)
- Other mandatory regulations issued by the Institute of Accounting and Auditing (ICAC) in developing the General Accounting Plan and its complementary norms.
- Other accounting standards that may be applicable.

#### B. ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLES

The principles and criteria applied in preparing these annual accounts are outlined in Note 4 of this report. All mandatory accounting principles affecting the assets, financial situation and results have been applied in preparing these annual accounts.



#### C. COMPARATIVE FINANCIAL INFORMATION

This year enters into force the Resolution of 29 January 2016 of the Institute of Accounting and Auditing regarding information to be included in annual accounts in relation to the deferral of payments to suppliers in commercial operations. Following what is said in the Resolution, during its first year of implementation, and as an exception, entities only have to provide information relating to the financial year 2015 and not comparative information regarding this new requirement.

#### D. CHANGES IN ACCOUNTING POLICIES

During tax year 2015 there have been no changes in accounting policies.

# 04 RECORDING AND VALUATION OF FIXED ASSETS

#### A. TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

Tangible fixed assets are recorded at their cost of acquisition, less accumulated depreciation and any recognised deterioration in value due to use.

Computer equipment is valued at its cost of acquisition and amortised equally across the first four years in which its use is foreseen.



#### **B. LEASE COMMITMENTS**

#### **OPERATING LEASES**

This concerns an agreement under which the lessee has right to use an asset during a specific period of time in exchange for a series of payments which are recorded as an expense in the tax year in which it arises.

#### C. FINANCIAL ASSETS AND LIABILITIES

#### 01. FINANCIAL ASSETS

The financial assets are recognised in the balance sheet at the moment of their acquisition and are recognised at fair value.

#### 02. FINANCIAL LIABILITIES

Financial liabilities are recognised at fair value minus the attributable transaction costs.

Liabilities maturing in less than twelve months from the balance sheet date are classified as current, while those with greater maturity are classified as non-current liabilities.

#### D. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand, bank deposits and other financial assets with a maturity not exceeding three months from the date of acquisition or establishment, as long as they are not subject to significant variations in value on account of their intrinsic characteristics.

#### E. INCOME TAXES

The Association is partially exempt from the corporate income tax.

The Association was required to submit the corporate income tax return for the year 2013 because its income exceeded the €100,000 annual exemption.

The Association was required to submit the corporate income tax return for the year 2014 because its income exceeded the €100,000 annual exemption.

The Association is required to submit the corporate income tax return for the year 2015 because its income exceeded the €75,000 annual exemption.

#### F. INCOME AND EXPENSES

Income and expenses are recorded on an accruals basis regardless of the date of collection or payment.

# G. GRANTS AND DONATIONS

These are accounted initially, and generally, as income directly attributable to the net equity and are recognised in the income statement according to their purpose:



Restricted purpose grants are allocated to income in the same year in which the accrued expenses are incurred.

Core funding grants donated for general purposes are allocated as revenue in the year in which those general expenses are incurred on a time-apportioned basis.
